

March Family Fun

Balloon Tennis

This is the ultimate boredom buster for those long winter months and is great for gross motor skills too! This game will get everyone moving and chasing balloons around the house. It's important for kids to get their energy out. The supplies are really inexpensive. In fact, you can get paint sticks for free at most hardware stores or use large popsicle sticks instead.



Supplies needed:

2 or more paper plates Crayons/markers to decorate (optional) Paint/Popsicle sticks (one for each plate) Hot glue gun balloons

To make the paddles...you can let your child decorate the plate first or simply hot glue a stick to a paper plate, and bam! You've got a balloon racket. All you need now are a few kids and a balloon for the fun to begin.

* a fly swatter or similar object can be used in place of the paper plate rackets.

One Fish, Two Fish, Red Fish, Blue Fish Snack

In honor of the late great Dr. Seuss who would be over 100 years old on March 2nd try this simple snack your children will enjoy. Absolutely no skill or talent required! While the Jell-O is setting up you can read One Fish, Two Fish, Red Fish Blue Fish with your child

Ingredients:

1 Box blue jello Swedish Fish



Directions:

Follow the directions on a box of blue Jello to make it then divide the mixture into four clear plastic cups. Put in the refrigerator until the Jell- O is set.

RAINBOW IN A JAR



You will need:

A tall, see-through container (mason jar works great)

1/2 cup Honey

½ cup Light corn syrup

½ cup Dish soap (blue like Dawn)

½ cup or more Olive oil

½ cup Rubbing alcohol

½ cup Water

Food coloring

A dropper

Your child will not understand the science behind this density experiment but they will love the end result...A RAINBOW!! This direction is very important...when adding the first five ingredients to the jar carefully pour the liquids slowly into the middle of the jar so none of it gets on the sides of the jar. First, pour in a layer of honey. Next, color the corn syrup purple by mixing 1 drop of red and 1 drop of blue food coloring then pour this layer into the jar. Pour a layer of blue dish soap in next. Now add a drop or two of green food coloring to the water and add this layer. The olive oil goes in next. Pour a fairly thick layer of oil it will come in handy for the next step. Finally, add red food coloring to the rubbing alcohol. You will notice that the food coloring just sits at the bottom of the alcohol when you first drop it in. This time DON'T POUR IT IN THE MIDDLE! This is where the dropper comes in. If you pour the alcohol straight in, it'll probably pick up the green food coloring you used in the water and your rainbow will be ruined. Instead, use the dropper to add the alcohol along the side of the container. The key is to not "breaking through" the oil layer into the green water layer beneath it - that's why you need a thick layer of oil.

MY TODDLER IS BITING: UNDERSTANDING AND RESPONDING TO YOUR CHILD

Biting is a very common behavior among toddlers; infants experiment with biting too. When your child bites someone it can seem worse than a full-blown temper tantrum in the middle of a busy store. The other child is crying, other parents are upset and you just want to hide. When a toddler bites, you might feel frustrated, angry, annoyed, embarrassed, or worried. All of these feelings are normal. Try to see biting as a way of communicating rather than just bad behavior. Many toddlers go through a "biting stage" so don't feel you are alone. However, there is a lot that parents and caregivers can do to reduce and eventually eliminate biting. It is helpful to remember that not all children bite out of anger or to hurt another child some children bite instinctively, because they have not developed self-control and some bite in order to cope with a challenge or to fulfill a need. Be sure your behavior expectations are age-appropriate and individually appropriate for your child. Understanding why a child bites is important. Ask yourself what the child is gaining by biting? What is the reward... does he get your undivided attention?



A child might bite to...

- Relieve pain from teething.
- Explore cause and effect ("What happens when I bite?").
- Experience the sensation of biting.
- Satisfy a need for oral-motor stimulation.
- Imitate other children and adults.
- Feel strong and in control. (biting gets the adult or child to do what they want)
- Get attention.
- Act in self-defense/defend (when you bite, your victim moves away)
- Communicate needs and desires, such as hunger or fatigue.
- Communicate or express difficult feelings, such as frustration, anger, confusion, love or fear.

A child might bite because they...


- Lack language skills necessary for expressing important needs or strong feelings like anger, frustration, joy, love
- Are overwhelmed by the sounds, light or activity level in this setting
- Are experimenting to see what will happen
- Have a need for oral stimulation
- Need more active playtime
- Are over-tired
- Are teething
- Are impulsive

If you think your child might be biting due to a need for oral stimulation, offer them something they can safely bite and chew on a cracker, pretzel, some carrot sticks, or a teether. If the bite was over a toy or treat, remove it for a short while. Look at who they bite, when they bite and in what situations or what triggers it and try to intervene before your child bites. Give your child a firm "bear" hug when you sense he is feeling stressed, out of control and might about to bite. This can help children feel secure, held together and in control which can be very soothing.

How can you stop biting? First, keep your own feelings in check, react swiftly, and keep your cool. Get down to their level and in a firm, matter-of-fact voice say: "No biting. biting hurts!" Comment on how the other child is feeling (cause and effect): "You bit Matt and now he is crying. It hurts your friends when you bite them ." Then give your attention to the victim NOT the biter. Acknowledge your child's feelings, you might say, "You are frustrated because...let's try ..." Later, when your child is calm try to teach them other ways to express their needs and desires. Having and keeping a plan of action is more difficult than you'd think but it is important to have a plan and be consistent. Make sure all your family and caregivers are on the same page. It is difficult for young children when they receive mixed messages. If you use time-out, now might be a good time to use it. If all other methods fail remove your child from the situation.


What doesn't work? Yelling, shaming or harsh punishments can actually increase biting incidents. Biting back or hitting teaches your child that it's okay to bite and hit people when they're upset. NEVER BITE OR HIT YOUR CHILD! If you've been consistent and your child continues to bite ask for help or advice from friends, other parents or teachers. You can also talk to your pediatrician, who can also point you in the right direction.


Celebrate Read Across America & Dr. Seuss' Birthday this month with our March Book Picks...
