## Science FUN Fireworks...they FIZZLE then POP!



A fun science experiment and art project all in one. You will want to do this one outside it is messy! You will need a few supplies I am sure you already have at home: vinegar, baking soda, Ziplock sandwich bags, food coloring or washable paint, paper towel (toilet paper or tissues will work too!) water, and a measuring cup.

If you want to make this an art project you will need a large piece of paper or cardboard to lay in the yard. First, you will need to make your time release packets with a paper towel approximately 5x5 inches square . Place  $1\frac{1}{2}$ tablespoons of baking soda in the center. Fold it into thirds keeping the baking soda inside, then fold into thirds the opposite way to make a square packet. Next, put your coloring into the Ziplock bags and pour in 1/2 cup vinegar and a 1/4 cup of warm water into each bag and mix to distribute the color throughout. Now here is where it can get messy! Zip the bag halfway closed, put the time-release packet into the mouth of the bag and hold it up out of the vinegar by pinching the sides of the bag. Zip the bag closed and then let the packet drop into the vinegar. Shake the bag a little, put it on the ground, and stand back this is where it gets really messy! The bag will puff up dramatically and POP with a bang spreading color all around.

### PATRIOTIC FINE MOTOR PLAY



Here is a quick, fun patriotic fine motor activity your child will love to do. Stick red, white and blue labeling stickers on the bubbles of a piece of bubble

wrap. Now... you can let your child just enjoy popping them OR make it into a listening/color recognition activity by telling your child to... "Pop a red one." (or blue or white). The pop will sound like the crack of fireworks.

## Graham Cracker Flags



A healthy snack that is simple to make. You will need some honey graham crackers, plain cream cheese (yogurt or icing) and a hand-

ful of fresh red and blue colored fruit (strawberries or raspberries & blueberries). Let your child spread the cream cheese on one side of a graham cracker rectangle. Lay two to four blueberries on one corner of your cream cheese covered graham cracker then add the "red" stripes of the flag by cutting your choice of red berry in half and lay them in two rows on your graham cracker. You now have a flag snack to enjoy!

## 4th of July Confetti Poppers

Here is another fun idea to try. Make a reusable popper to fire "paper fireworks" during your 4<sup>th</sup> of July activities. You will need a small plastic water/pop bottle, colored paper (red, white and blue), a balloon, and tape for the edge of the bottle where you will cut it. It can be masking, duct, or wasabi tape.

To make: Cut the top  $2\frac{1}{2}$  to 3 inches from a clean plastic bottle and discard the rest. Cover the cut edge with tape. Stretch the mouth of a party balloon over the bottle's opening and pull it down, working the neck of the balloon over the threads of the bottleneck. Cut or tear paper into confetti, then pour the pieces into the popper.



To use: Hold onto the bottle neck with one hand and pull down on the bottom of the balloon with the other. Let the balloon snap to launch a shower of confetti. No big bangs or smoke but still really cool!

## Patriotic Shirts for Everyone

Here area few fun ways to make 4th of July T-shirts for the whole family. You will need white t-shirts for everyone. Depending on which one you choose to make you will need Tie Dye or fabric paint.

### Tie Dye



You can Tie Dye the traditional way by twisting and using rubber bands then submerging the shirt in the dye OR use basters or squirt guns/bottles to spray color on.

Another fun way is to hang the shirt from a clothesline, tree branch or lay on the ground. Fill water squirters, basters or squirt bottles with different colors of dye then let your child squirt/spray the color on the shirt.



## Pipe Cleaner Painting



Besides the t-shirt you will need pipe cleaners, fabric paint (any colors), a piece of cardboard to put inside shirt), and something to squirt your paint onto. Get 3 -6 pipe cleaners and twist them together to create a handle (About2/3 of the way down). Take the other end and fan the rest of the pipe cleaner pieces out. You will want to make several and you can vary the lengths or mix short and long pieces together to get different looks. Get your paint ready then, dip in the paint and stamp it on the shirt. You can layer one or several colors to get the desired effect. Let dry before wearing.

## Hand Print Flag

Use red, white, and blue fabric paint, your hand and a paint brush to create this fun flag shirt. First, place a piece of cardboard inside the shirt. Paint your hand blue and press in the upper left corner of the shirt (it will be on the right side once you put it on). Use a paint brush to paint red stripes, then dip fingers in white paint to create the stars on the handprint. Let dry before wearing.



### FUN IN THE SUN SAFETY TIPS


The sun's rays are strongest between 10AM- 4PM.

- \* Whenever your child is outside, even on cloudy days, use sunscreen with a protection factor of no less than 15 and choose one that protects against UVA and UVB rays.
- \* Reapply sunscreen every 2 hours and more often if swimming. Keep children under 1 out of the sun; sunscreen can be applied if your child is over 6 months old.
- \* Use hats to protect their heads from the sun.
- \* Sunglasses should provide 100% UV protection.
- Find shady areas to cool off.
- st Be sure to offer lots of fluids (water is best) even if they are not thirsty.




## SEARCH AND COOL OFF

fireworks show!


