## October 26th Pumpkin Picking Sensory Play with Jello

Pumpkin picking in Jello? Yep, you read it right!

Today we are going to explore sensory play with Jello. You will need to plan ahead for this one so that your Jello is set-up. Using our fingers, spoons, or tongs we are going to pick the pumpkins out of the Jello. We might even eat some while we are exploring it.



### A pumpkin story and snack about differences and acceptance!

Spookley the Square Pumpkin Snack

You will need:
Graham Crackers
Icing
Red/yellow food coloring
Candy eyes
Black gel for mouth
Green fruit roll
or a tootsie roll for stem



#### Directions:

Make orange icing by adding 1 drop red and 6 drops of yellow food coloring. Break a graham cracker in half to make two squares. Frost each graham cracker square with the orange icing. Immediately add the eyes and stem.

Then, using the black decorating gel draw a smile on each. If you wanted to make it healthier you could use cream cheese and fruit to create your pumpkin cracker snack. Be creative, it doesn't have to look the same.

While your child is enjoying their snack you could read them the story The Legend of Spookley the Square Pumpkin. A very unique pumpkin delivers a special message of tolerance and self-acceptance.

Spookley was different. He was odd, he was rare.

Spookley the pumpkin wasn't round- he was...square!

A story about a patch filled with all sorts of oddly shaped and colorful pumpkins-showing how good being different can be.

# Pumpkin Faces Exploring Emotions Through Play Silly





Children watch us. How we express our emotions sends powerful messages to them. Toddlers don't always have the words to express their feelings. Learning about emotions through play gives them a chance to explore and express emotions safely. Here are a few fun ways to explore and label emotions using pumpkins.

Explore emotions using the pumpkin pages at the end of the newsletter (there is a colored or a black and white version your child can color). You print multiple pages to use, laminate them, or print them on card stock for durability to reuse over and over or you can make your own. Here are some activities to try:

- \* Use them as playdough mats- make faces using playdough; is your jack -o'-lantern happy?, sad?, mad?,..
- \* Use markers or crayons to draw faces on them— how is your jack -o'-lantern feeling?
- \* Cut out and use the jack -o'-lantern face pieces to create happy, sad, mad, silly, and surprised pumpkins. Pieces can be glued down, laid on top, or use Velcro to interchange and make all kinds of faces.
- \* Make a jack -o'-lantern faces book and talk about their faces/emotions.
- \*Read -It's Pumpkin Day, Mouse! and talk about the pumpkin faces Mouse paints.
- \* Sing- Can You Make a Happy Face? Jack -o'-lantern (on the next page); repeat the song exchanging happy for mad, silly, surprised, and sad face (add some of your own too). Make faces to match the emotion you are singing about.

### Pumpkin Picking Sensory Play



Food makes a great base for sensory bins there are so many textures. Some food can be reused repeatedly in sensory bins like beans, lentils, flour, corn flour,

etc. and some can only be used one time and then thrown out. This is a one use sensory bin and is great for those kids that put everything in their mouth. It is good to eat and play with at the same time.

To make this sensory bin you will need orange Jello, a rectangular cake pan or cookie container, and pumpkin candies. Make your Jello according to the package instructions then pour the mixture into your container making sure there is enough to cover your pumpkin candies. Carefully place the pumpkin candies into the Jello with the stem up. You will want to scatter them throughout so there is enough room for your child to pick the pumpkins out of the Jello. Place the Jello into the refrigerator until it is firm (about four hours). Be

sure to plan ahead so the Jello pumpkin patch is ready for play. Have the following available for your child to experiment with: small tongs, spoons, small empty bowls, or ice cube trays.

Encourage your child to pick the pumpkins out of the Jello using their fingers, tongs, or the spoon. Your child may want to just pick the pumpkins out and eat them or eat the Jello. A favorite activity of young children is filling and dumping (another way they might play with the activity). They may want to fill a container with the pumpkins as they pick them out, then dump them all back in. If you have an empty ice cube tray you could ask your child to place one pumpkin in each hole of the ice cube tray, this is a great way to play and practice math skills like one-to-one correspondence and counting. You can build language and vocabulary skills by talking to your child about the color, or how does it feel-cold or warm, sticky, slimy, wet or dry, etc. This activity can get a little messy so you will want to cover the area with a plastic cloth or take it outside where clean-up will be easier. Be sure to have a washrag or container of water to wash up with after they are done.


Super simple and fun! Some kids just don't like the feel of the insides of the pumpkin-cold, wet, stringy, and slimy. You don't have to carve your pumpkins to create Jack-o-lanterns, you can paint them instead! You don't even have to make a Jack-o-lantern you can just paint the whole pumpkin however you'd like.



You may want to cover the area with newspaper or a plastic table cloth and have some water available to rinse the brush between colors. Make sure your pumpkin is free of dirt before painting. You can also add embellishments like glitter, pompoms, sequins, googly eyes, etc. if you choose.

Mouse is excited for fall because that means it is time to decorate pumpkins! But one is missing. Where could it have gone?




Pumpkin


### Pumpkin Song

\*Repeat using mad, silly, surprised, and sad face. Make faces to match the emotion you are singing about.





Pumpkin, Pumpkin, sat on a wall. (bounce baby/child on lap)


Pumpkin, Pumpkin, tip and fall, (lean baby/child to one side then the other)
